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Mission

The Gesundheit! Institute, is a 501(c)3 registered project in holistic medical care based on the belief that one cannot separate the health of the individual from the health of the family, the community, the world, and the health care system itself.

Since it was founded over 40 years ago by Patch Adams MD, Gesundheit Institute has offered care to tens of thousands, given workshops and lectures in 65 countries, built two medical clinics in El Salvador, mounted a health and hygiene campaign in Peru, helped develop arts programs in orphanages in Russia, and brought the joy of clowning to parts of the world damaged by violence and injustice.

The Patch Adams Teaching Center is headquarters for Gesundheit Institute's education programs and projects. Located in a stunning valley of West Virginia's Pocahontas County, The Teaching Center will host year-round health programs organized by the Gesundheit Institute and our partners. With the Teaching Center, and Clinic, our intention is to deliver health care in a context that is our ideal design and educate other health care practitioners to design their ideal models for care. A fully operational Teaching Center will allow us to offer up to 20 programs a year serving between 900 and 1,200 program participants annually. Last year we hosted over 300 health practitioners, volunteers, educators, students, artists and activists in programs designed to spark creative problem solving in health care delivery. Gesundheit addresses, by action, four major issues in health care delivery: the rising cost of care, dehumanization of medicine, malpractice suits, and abuse of third-party insurance.

Gesundheit began as a group of twenty friends, including three doctors, who moved into a six-bedroom home and opened it as a free hospital. The hospital was open 24 hours a day and 7 days a week for all manner of medical problems, from birth to death. Over its 12year history, the medical team saw 15,000 patients. These early years provided a "proof of concept," affirm ing that loving care can transform the relationship between health practitioners and patients. The tenents of Gesundheit style medical practice that Patch and his team pioneered during this period continue to undergird the work and teaching of the Gesundheit Institute.

In 1981, Gesundheit purchased 321 acres in Pocahontas County, West Virginia. Infrastructure construction included building a 3-storey art center, a domed "dacha" for housing up to 8 staff members, a chrysalis-shaped classroom, a lake, gardens, and expansion to the existing farmhouse.

An operational Clinic will allow the Gesundheit Institute to see patients for the first time since 1979.

The free Clinic will be open 24/7, and will have a staff of 10 serving the people of West Virginia, in one of the poorest counties in the U.S. the Clinic will provide a model for students and medical professionals to practice medicine with care and compassion amidst a playful, professional team. A special emphasis will be on prevention, regarding individual health behaviors and overall public health.

In addition to examination rooms and physician offices, the 20,000 foot clinic will have a greenhouse, radiology suite, and arboretum. Primary care services provided will include full family medical and dental care, mental health care, pediatric care, women's health care, and pregnancy care. Additional medical services will include podiatry, health screening, blood pressure clinics, dietary counseling, a pulmonary clinic, a diabetic club, authorized lab and x-ray assistance, eye care and patient advocacy, nutritional planning, sickle cell testing, social services, ultrasounds, and referrals.

Infrastructure

EST. COST: \$1,500,000

Provides for roads, water, creek diversion, site work, and permanent electric and septic facilities for the Teaching Center, Residence and Clinic. The clinic will serve residents of Pocahontas County, West Virginia and outlying areas. West Virginia has a higherpoverty rate than the national average for all age groups. 24% of its population is disabled, with a relatively highnumber of homebound seniors. In the County, only 11% of adults over the age of 25 have a college degree.(U.s. Census, 2006)

Patients will benefit from care unencumbered by financial restraints, by wellness-oriented care, and from the sense of belonging to the Gesundheit community; clinic staff will benefit from the non-hierarchical, playful teamwork and freedom to practice as they choose; and students will benefit from experiencing medicine as a compassionate service to their community.

Phase IV

Staff Residence

EST. COST: \$2,000,000

The staff residence will lodge 10 permanent Gesundheit staff members and up to 15 additional guest teachers. It will include a staff kitchen and lounge, with a range of private and group accommodation. The staff residence will be approximately 8,000 sq. ft and expand Gesundheit's faciliities to accom modate year-round staff. "Gesundheit moves like an onion---starting with the small center, health care, and then moves out to show the multi-nested structures that confine and constrain health care." Dr. Susan Parenti

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Patch Adams, MD

Patch Adams is best known for his work as a medical doctor and a clown, and he is also a social activist who has devoted 40 years to changing America's health care system. He believes that laughter, joy and creativity are an integral part of the healing process. Since founding Gesundheit in 1970, he has worked relentlessly to expose the injustices of the American health care system, and advocate for justice for poor and disenfranchised people everywhere in the world.

The Great Vision A Hospital for the Underserved

The hospital at Gesundheit Institute will be the realization of over 40 years of designing a health care model that addresses the current society's problems with health care delivery. We aim to redefine the very notion of hospital.

G: HOSPITAL

Our model is organized around these principles:

- We will not accept third party insurance reimbursemnet; care is free.


- Patients are treated as friends.

- Ample time is given to the care interaction; initial intake interviews with patients are three hours long.

- All complementary medicine is welcome

The health of the staff is as important as the health of the patients.
Care is infused with fun and play.

At full capacity, the hospital will serve up to 75 patients daily, with 40 beds for outpatient care. In addition there will be 60 beds for staff and 60 beds for their families. We will prioritize creative, playful care that addresses the needs of our immediate community in Pocahontas County, WV. According to our health care needs assessment conducted in 2010, the primary concerns for local citizens are dental care, drug/alcohol education, and healthy food access/nutrition education. Health care systems around the world have become unhealthy. There are the well-known problems of affordability and access, partially addressed by various national health services. However the prevailing mindset in health care systems design tends toward the distant, the impersonal, the corporate, the top-down, the technocratic—toward allopathic medicine rather than holistic care. Too often the emphasis is on disease management rather than health. Many people have the intuition that healthy health care would mean care that is integrated with all that is good in life: vibrant physical, emotional, intellectual, spiritual well-being, including meaningful relationships with friends, family, community and society. What we lack are functioning examples of medical care and health care education that put this common gream into practice.

The Urgent Need

Over the past several years, some general health trends indicate that the health of West Virginians is deteriorating. According to the National Center for Chronic Disease Prevention and Health Promotion, obesity rates have risen from 18.3% in 1995 to 31.7% in 2009. 65% of adults in West Virginia are either obese or overweight, which is 5% higher than the percentage of obese or overweight people in all of America, and 35.5% of children are either overweight or obese. With this, diabetes increased from 4.7% in 1995 to 9.8% in 2003. Now, 12.3% of adults in West Virginia have diabetes. When surveyed, 23.7% of West Virginia residents said they are in poor health.
